GENERAL RULES

STANDARD FLOWER SHOW

1. Exhibits may be entered by any garden club member and the public.
 - a. Division I, Horticulture, is open to all gardeners.
 - b. Division II, Design is open to all gardeners.
 - c. Division III, Special Exhibits, Youth Horticulture/Design
 - Section A – Juniors (Pre-school through age 7)
 - Section B – Intermediate (Age 8 through 12)
 - Section C – High School (Age 13 through 18)
2. Complete entry cards: name, address and phone number.
3. Entries accepted: Thursday, May 31, 2018, 6:00 pm-8 pm
Friday, June 1, 2018, 7am-9am
4. Judging begins: Friday, June 1, 2018, 10am
Judges decisions are final.
Awards may be withheld, if not merited.
5. Pick up entries: Saturday, June 2, 2018, 4:30 pm
Dismantling: Saturday, June 2, 2018, 4:30 pm
6. Chairpersons present during judging are:
General Chair, Classification, Clerks, Judges and Hospitality.
7. Conformity to the schedule is managed by the Classification Chairman using the 2007 edition of the "National Garden Clubs Inc. Handbook for Flower Shows, with corrections", as the authority.
8. The National Garden Clubs Standard System of Awards will be used for all competitive judging:
 - One (1) First place (Blue, scoring 90 points or above)
 - One (1) Second place (Red, scoring 85 points or above)
 - One (1) Third place (Yellow, scoring 80 points or above)
 - Honorable Mentions (White, scoring 75 points or above)
9. Top Exhibitor Awards may be awarded, if merited. Exhibits scoring 95 points or above are eligible for top awards.
10. Fresh plant material is the emphasis throughout the show; no artificial plant materials are permitted.
11. Use of State native plants, noxious plants and those on its conservation list are prohibited.

DIVISION I – HORTICULTURE

HORTICULTURE RULES

1. All plant material **MUST** be fresh and have been grown by the exhibitor.
2. Ownership must be continuous from planting to showing.
3. All entry cards are to be filled out in advance, (if possible) – Typed, waterproof ink, labels or pencil. Address labels may be used. Phone number is required. Entry cards may be obtained from the following locations: Lebanon Chamber of Commerce, Lebanon Senior Center or Lebanon-Express newspaper.
4. Entry cards reviewed by Horticulture Classification Chairman for correct botanical name then placed on Placement Table to be placed on exhibit.
5. Potted plants must have been planted six weeks before entry.
6. All entries are to be correctly labeled by genus, species, and/or variety. Common names may also be given.
Only correctly named exhibits are eligible for Top NGC Awards.
7. Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class or sub-class, if each is a different variety or color.
8. Specimens should not have foliage below water level.
9. Containers and wedging material (plastic wrap) furnished, **except** for:
Class 13 - Violaceae (Viola) and
Class 30 - Violaceae (Pansy).
10. Classification Chair has the authority to sub-divide classes, if necessary.
11. Fresh plant material may never be treated with oil or color.
12. Unattached foliage is never exhibited with a bloom. Only foliage naturally grown on specimen and still attached is permitted in a Standard Flower Show.

DIVISION II – DESIGN

DESIGN RULES

1. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruits or vegetables are permitted.
2. Fresh plant material **must** never be treated.
3. There **must** be some fresh plant material used in every exhibit, except as noted.
4. Entry cards for Design are checked by Classification Chairman for correctness. Placement Committee member directs designer to location of the exhibit.
5. An exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class.
6. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted.
7. No backgrounds allowed unless stated in Schedule. Draping and accessories are permitted.
8. Design place allotted is approximately 24" x 26". Designs will be placed on a table and may be viewed from all sides unless schedule states otherwise.
9. Design must be the work of one individual, but need not have been grown by exhibitor.
